# 5 Solving Systems of Linear Equations

## Graphing Linear Functions

Example $1 \quad$ Graph $3+y=\frac{1}{2} x$.
Step 1 Rewrite the equation in slope-intercept form.

$$
y=\frac{1}{2} x-3
$$

Step 2 Find the slope and the $y$-intercept.

$$
m=\frac{1}{2} \text { and } b=-3
$$

Step 3 The $y$-intercept is -3 . So, plot $(0,-3)$.
Step 4 Use the slope to find another point on the line.

$$
\text { slope }=\frac{\text { rise }}{\text { run }}=\frac{1}{2}
$$



Plot the point that is 2 units right and 1 unit up from $(0,-3)$. Draw a line through the two points.

## Finding the Point of Intersection

You can use a graphing calculator to find the point of intersection, if it exists, of the graphs of two linear equations.

1. Enter the equations into a graphing calculator.
2. Graph the equations in an appropriate viewing window, so that the point of intersection is visible.
3. Use the intersect feature of the graphing calculator to find the point of intersection.

## EXAMPLE 1 Using a Graphing Calculator

Use a graphing calculator to find the point of intersection, if it exists, of the graphs of the two linear equations.

$$
\begin{array}{ll}
y=-\frac{1}{2} x+2 & \\
y=3 x-5 & \\
y & \text { Equation } 1 \\
\text { Equation 2 }
\end{array}
$$

## SOLUTION

The slopes of the lines are not the same, so you know that the lines intersect. Enter the equations into a graphing calculator. Then graph the equations in an appropriate viewing window.


Use the intersect feature to find the point of intersection of the lines.

The point of intersection is $(2,1)$.

## Systems of Linear Equations

A system of linear equations is a set of two or more linear equations in the same variables. An example is shown below.

$$
\begin{array}{ll}
x+y=7 & \text { Equation } 1 \\
2 x-3 y=-11 & \text { Equation } 2
\end{array}
$$

A solution of a system of linear equations in two variables is an ordered pair that is a solution of each equation in the system.

## EXAMPLE 1 Checking Solutions

Tell whether the ordered pair is a solution of the system of linear equations.
a. (2, 5); $\begin{array}{ll}x+y=7 & \text { Equation 1 } \\ 2 x-3 y=-11 & \text { Equation 2 }\end{array}$
b. $\begin{aligned} &(-2,0) ; y \\ & y=-2 x-4 \\ & y\end{aligned}$
Equation 1
Equation 2

## SOLUTION

a. Substitute 2 for $x$ and 5 for $y$ in each equation.

Equation 1

$$
\begin{aligned}
& x+y=7 \\
& 2+5 \stackrel{?}{=} 7
\end{aligned}
$$

$$
7=7
$$

Equation 2
$2 x-3 y=-11$
$2(2)-3(5) \stackrel{?}{=}-11$
$-11=-11$

Because the ordered pair $(2,5)$ is a solution of each equation, it is a solution of the linear system.
b. Substitute -2 for $x$ and 0 for $y$ in each equation.

Equation 1
$y=-2 x-4$
Equation 2
$0 \stackrel{?}{=}-2(-2)-4$
$x+4$
$0 \stackrel{?}{=}-2+4$
$0=0$


$$
0 \neq 2
$$

The ordered pair $(-2,0)$ is a solution of the first equation, but it is not a solution of the second equation. So, $(-2,0)$ is not a solution of the linear system.

## Solving Systems of Linear Equations by Graphing

The solution of a system of linear equations is the point of intersection of the graphs of the equations.

## G) Core Concept

## Solving a System of Linear Equations by Graphing

Step 1 Graph each equation in the same coordinate plane.
Step 2 Estimate the point of intersection.
Step 3 Check the point from Step 2 by substituting for $x$ and $y$ in each equation of the original system.

## EXAMPLE 2 Solving a System of Linear Equations by Graphing

Solve the system of linear equations by graphing.

$$
\begin{array}{ll}
y=-2 x+5 & \text { Equation 1 } \\
y=4 x-1 & \text { Equation 2 }
\end{array}
$$

## SOLUTION

Step 1 Graph each equation.
Step 2 Estimate the point of intersection.
The graphs appear to intersect at $(1,3)$.
Step 3 Check your point from Step 2.

Equation 1

$$
\begin{array}{ll}
y=-2 x+5 & y=4 x-1 \\
3 \stackrel{?}{=}-2(1)+5 & 3 \stackrel{?}{=} 4(1)-1 \\
3=3 & 3=3
\end{array}
$$

The solution is $(1,3)$.

## Solving Real-Life Problems

## EXAMPLE 3 Modeling with Mathematics



A roofing contractor buys 30 bundles of shingles and 4 rolls of roofing paper for $\$ 1040$. In a second purchase (at the same prices), the contractor buys 8 bundles of shingles for $\$ 256$. Find the price per bundle of shingles and the price per roll of roofing paper.

## SOLUTION

1. Understand the Problem You know the total price of each purchase and how many of each item were purchased. You are asked to find the price of each item.
2. Make a Plan Use a verbal model to write a system of linear equations that represents the problem. Then solve the system of linear equations.
3. Solve the Problem

Words $\quad 30 \cdot \begin{aligned} & \text { Price per } \\ & \text { bundle }\end{aligned}+4 \cdot \begin{aligned} & \text { Price } \\ & \text { per roll }\end{aligned}=1040$

$$
8 \cdot \begin{aligned}
& \text { Price per } \\
& \text { bundle }
\end{aligned}+0 \cdot \begin{aligned}
& \text { Price } \\
& \text { per roll }
\end{aligned}=256
$$

Variables Let $x$ be the price (in dollars) per bundle and let $y$ be the price (in dollars) per roll.

System $\quad 30 x+4 y=1040$

$$
8 x=256
$$

Equation 1
Equation 2

Step 1 Graph each equation. Note that only the first quadrant is shown because $x$ and $y$ must be positive.

Step 2 Estimate the point of intersection. The graphs appear to intersect at $(32,20)$.

Step 3 Check your point from Step 2.
Equation 1
Equation 2

$$
\begin{aligned}
30 x+4 y & =1040 \\
30(32)+4(20) & \stackrel{?}{=} 1040 \\
1040 & =1040
\end{aligned}
$$

$$
8 x=256
$$


$8(32) \stackrel{?}{=} 256$
$256=256$

The solution is $(32,20)$. So, the price per bundle of shingles is $\$ 32$, and the price per roll of roofing paper is $\$ 20$.
4. Look Back You can use estimation to check that your solution is reasonable. A bundle of shingles costs about $\$ 30$. So, 30 bundles of shingles and 4 rolls of roofing paper (at $\$ 20$ per roll) cost about $30(30)+4(20)=\$ 980$, and 8 bundles of shingles costs about $8(30)=\$ 240$. These prices are close to the given values, so the solution seems reasonable.

## Solving Linear Systems by Substitution

Another way to solve a system of linear equations is to use substitution.

## G) Core Concept

## Solving a System of Linear Equations by Substitution

Step 1 Solve one of the equations for one of the variables.
Step 2 Substitute the expression from Step 1 into the other equation and solve for the other variable.
Step 3 Substitute the value from Step 2 into one of the original equations and solve.

## EXAMPLE 1

## Solving a System of Linear Equations by Substitution

Solve the system of linear equations by substitution.

| $y=-2 x-9$ | Equation 1 |
| :--- | :--- |
| $6 x-5 y=-19$ | Equation 2 |

## SOLUTION

Step 1 Equation 1 is already solved for $y$.
Step 2 Substitute $-2 x-9$ for $y$ in Equation 2 and solve for $x$.

$$
\begin{aligned}
6 x-5 y & =-19 & & \text { Equation } 2 \\
6 x-5(-2 x-9) & =-19 & & \text { Substitute }-2 x-9 \text { for } y . \\
6 x+10 x+45 & =-19 & & \text { Distributive Property } \\
16 x+45 & =-19 & & \text { Combine like terms. } \\
16 x & =-64 & & \text { Subtract } 45 \text { from each side. } \\
x & =-4 & & \text { Divide each side by } 16 .
\end{aligned}
$$

Step 3 Substitute -4 for $x$ in Equation 1 and solve for $y$.

$$
\begin{aligned}
\qquad \begin{aligned}
y & =-2 x-9 \\
& =-2(-4)-9 \\
& =8-9 \\
& =-1
\end{aligned} & & \text { Equation } 1 \\
\text { The solution is }(-4,-1) . & & \text { Mubstitute }-4 \text { for } x .
\end{aligned}
$$

## EXAMPLE 2

## Solving a System of Linear Equations by Substitution

ANOTHER WAY
You could also begin by solving for $x$ in Equation 1, solving for $y$ in Equation 2, or solving for $x$ in Equation 2.

Solve the system of linear equations by substitution.

$$
\begin{array}{ll}
-x+y=3 & \text { Equation 1 } \\
3 x+y=-1 & \text { Equation 2 }
\end{array}
$$

## SOLUTION

Step 1 Solve for $y$ in Equation 1.

$$
y=x+3
$$

Revised Equation 1
Step 2 Substitute $x+3$ for $y$ in Equation 2 and solve for $x$.

$$
\begin{aligned}
3 x+y & =-1 & & \text { Equation } 2 \\
3 x+(x+3) & =-1 & & \text { Substitute } x+3 \text { for } y . \\
4 x+3 & =-1 & & \text { Combine like terms. } \\
4 x & =-4 & & \text { Subtract } 3 \text { from each side. } \\
x & =-1 & & \text { Divide each side by } 4 .
\end{aligned}
$$

Step 3 Substitute -1 for $x$ in Equation 1 and solve for $y$.

$$
\begin{aligned}
-x+y & =3 \\
-(-1)+y & =3 \\
y & =2
\end{aligned}
$$

Substitute -1 for $x$.
Subtract 1 from each side.

The solution is $(-1,2)$.

## Algebraic Check

Equation 1

$$
\begin{array}{r}
-x+y=3 \\
-(-1)+2 \stackrel{?}{=} 3 \\
3=3
\end{array}
$$

Equation 2

## Graphical Check



$$
\begin{array}{r}
3 x+y=-1 \\
3(-1)+2 \stackrel{?}{=}-1 \\
-1=-1
\end{array}
$$

## EXAMPLE 3 Modeling with Mathematics



## STUDY TIP

You can use either of the original equations to solve for $x$. However, using Equation 2 requires fewer calculations.

A drama club earns $\$ 1040$ from a production. A total of 64 adult tickets and 132 student tickets are sold. An adult ticket costs twice as much as a student ticket. Write a system of linear equations that represents this situation. What is the price of each type of ticket?

## SOLUTION

1. Understand the Problem You know the amount earned, the total numbers of adult and student tickets sold, and the relationship between the price of an adult ticket and the price of a student ticket. You are asked to write a system of linear equations that represents the situation and find the price of each type of ticket.
2. Make a Plan Use a verbal model to write a system of linear equations that represents the problem. Then solve the system of linear equations.

## 3. Solve the Problem

Words $64 \cdot \begin{aligned} & \text { Adult ticket } \\ & \text { price }\end{aligned}+132 \cdot \begin{aligned} & \text { Student } \\ & \text { ticket price }\end{aligned}=1040$
$\begin{aligned} & \text { Adult ticket } \\ & \text { price }\end{aligned}=2 \cdot \begin{aligned} & \text { Student } \\ & \text { ticket price }\end{aligned}$
Variables Let $x$ be the price (in dollars) of an adult ticket and let $y$ be the price (in dollars) of a student ticket.

System $\quad 64 x+132 y=1040 \quad$ Equation 1

$$
x=2 y \quad \text { Equation } 2
$$

Step 1 Equation 2 is already solved for $x$.
Step 2 Substitute $2 y$ for $x$ in Equation 1 and solve for $y$.

$$
\begin{aligned}
64 x+132 y & =1040 & & \text { Equation } 1 \\
64(2 y)+132 y & =1040 & & \text { Substitute } 2 y \text { for } x . \\

## Solving Linear Systems by Elimination

## Core Concept

## Solving a System of Linear Equations by Elimination

Step 1 Multiply, if necessary, one or both equations by a constant so at least one pair of like terms has the same or opposite coefficients.

Step 2 Add or subtract the equations to eliminate one of the variables.
Step 3 Solve the resulting equation.
Step 4 Substitute the value from Step 3 into one of the original equations and solve for the other variable.

You can use elimination to solve a system of equations because replacing one equation in the system with the sum of that equation and a multiple of the other produces a system that has the same solution. Here is why.

Consider System 1. In this system, $a$ and $c$ are algebraic expressions, and $b$ and $d$ are constants. Begin by multiplying each side of Equation 2 by a constant $k$. By the Multiplication Property of Equality, $k c=k d$. You can rewrite Equation 1 as Equation 3 by adding $k c$ on the left and $k d$ on the right. You can rewrite Equation 3 as Equation 1 by subtracting $k c$ on the left and $k d$ on the right. Because you can rewrite either system as the other, System 1 and System 2 have the same solution.

## EXAMPLE 1

## Solving a System of Linear Equations by Elimination

Solve the system of linear equations by elimination.

$$
\begin{array}{ll}
3 x+2 y=4 & \text { Equation 1 } \\
3 x-2 y=-4 & \\
\text { Equation 2 }
\end{array}
$$

## SOLUTION

Step 1 Because the coefficients of the $y$-terms are opposites, you do not need to multiply either equation by a constant.
Step 2 Add the equations.

$$
\begin{array}{rlrl}
3 x+2 y & =4 & & \text { Equation } 1 \\
3 x-2 y & =-4 & & \text { Equation } 2 \\
\hline 6 x & & =0 & \\
\text { Add the equations. }
\end{array}
$$

Step 3 Solve for $x$.

$$
\begin{aligned}
6 x & =0 & & \text { Resulting equation from Step } 2 \\
x & =0 & & \text { Divide each side by } 6 .
\end{aligned}
$$

Step 4 Substitute 0 for $x$ in one of the original equations and solve for $y$.

$$
\begin{aligned}
3 x+2 y & =4 & & \text { Equation } 1 \\
3(0)+2 y & =4 & & \text { Substitute } 0 \text { for } x . \\
y & =2 & & \text { Solve for } y .
\end{aligned}
$$

The solution is $(0,2)$.

## EXAMPLE 2

## Solving a System of Linear Equations by Elimination

Solve the system of linear equations by elimination.

$$
\begin{array}{ll}
-10 x+3 y=1 & \text { Equation 1 } \\
-5 x-6 y=23 & \text { Equation 2 }
\end{array}
$$

## SOLUTION

Step 1 Multiply Equation 2 by -2 so that the coefficients of the $x$-terms are opposites.

$$
\begin{array}{llll}
-10 x+3 y=1 & & -10 x+3 y=1 & \text { Equation 1 } \\
-5 x-6 y=23 & \text { Multiply by -2. } & 10 x+12 y=-46 & \text { Revised Equation 2 }
\end{array}
$$

Step 2 Add the equations.

$$
\begin{aligned}
-10 x+3 y & =1 & & \text { Equation 1 } \\
10 x+12 y & =-46 & & \text { Revised Equation 2 } \\
\hline 15 y & =-45 & & \text { Add the equations. }
\end{aligned}
$$

Step 3 Solve for $y$.

$$
\begin{aligned}
15 y & =-45 \\
y & =-3
\end{aligned}
$$

Resulting equation from Step 2
Divide each side by 15 .
Step 4 Substitute -3 for $y$ in one of the original equations and solve for $x$.

$$
\begin{aligned}
-5 x-6 y & =23 & & \text { Equation } 2 \\
-5 x-6(-3) & =23 & & \text { Substitute }-3 \text { for } y . \\
-5 x+18 & =23 & & \text { Multiply. } \\
-5 x & =5 & & \text { Subtract } 18 \text { from each side. } \\
x & =-1 & & \text { Divide each side by }-5 .
\end{aligned}
$$

The solution is $(-1,-3)$.

2. Make a Plan Use a verbal model to write a system of linear equations that represents the problem. Then solve the system of linear equations.

4 x+6 y & =320,000 & & \text { Revised Equation 2 } \\
\hline-11 x & =-385,000 & & \text { Add the equations. }
\end{aligned}
$$

Step 3 Solving the equation $-11 x=-385,000$ gives $x=35,000$.
Step 4 Substitute 35,000 for $x$ in one of the original equations and solve for $y$.

You can solve some linear systems by inspection. In Example 1, notice you can rewrite the system as

$$
\begin{aligned}
& -2 x+y=1 \\
& -2 x+y=-5 .
\end{aligned}
$$

This system has no solution because $-2 x+y$ cannot be equal to both 1 and -5.

A linear system with no solution is called an inconsistent system.

## Solutions of Systems of Linear Equations

A system of linear equations can have one solution, no solution, or infinitely many solutions.


## EXAMPLE 1 Solving a System: No Solution

Solve the system of linear equations.

$$
\begin{array}{ll}
y=2 x+1 & \text { Equation 1 } \\
y=2 x-5 & \text { Equation 2 }
\end{array}
$$

## SOLUTION

Method 1 Solve by graphing.
Graph each equation.
The lines have the same slope and different $y$-intercepts. So, the lines are parallel.

Because parallel lines do not intersect, there is no point that is a solution of both equations.

So, the system of linear equations
 has no solution.

Method 2 Solve by substitution.
Substitute $2 x-5$ for $y$ in Equation 1.

$$
\begin{aligned}
y & =2 x+1 & & \text { Equation } 1 \\
2 x-5 & =2 x+1 & & \text { Substitute } 2 x-5 \text { for } y . \\
-5 & =1 \quad X & & \text { Subtract } 2 x \text { from each side. }
\end{aligned}
$$

The equation $-5=1$ is never true. So, the system of linear equations has no solution.

## EXAMPLE 2 Solving a System: Infinitely Many Solutions

Solve the system of linear equations.

$$
\begin{array}{ll}
-2 x+y=3 & \text { Equation 1 } \\
-4 x+2 y=6 & \text { Equation 2 }
\end{array}
$$

## SOLUTION

Method 1 Solve by graphing.
Graph each equation.


The lines have the same slope and the same $y$-intercept. So, the lines are the same. Because the lines are the same, all points on the line are solutions of both equations.

So, the system of linear equations has infinitely many solutions.

Method 2 Solve by elimination.
Step 1 Multiply Equation 1 by -2 .

$$
\begin{array}{lll}
-2 x+y=3 & \text { Multiply by }-2 . & 4 x-2 y=-6 \\
-4 x+2 y=6 & & \text { Revised Equation 1 }  \tag{Equation 2}\\
-4 x+2 y=6
\end{array} \quad \text { Equation 2 }
$$

Step 2 Add the equations.

## STUDY TIP

A linear system with infinitely many solutions is called a consistent dependent system.

$$
\begin{aligned}
4 x-2 y & =-6 & & \text { Revised Equation 1 } \\
-4 x+2 y & =6 & & \text { Equation 2 } \\
\hline 0 & =0 & & \text { Add the equations. }
\end{aligned}
$$

The equation $0=0$ is always true. So, the solutions are all the points on the line $-2 x+y=3$. The system of linear equations has infinitely many solutions.

Method 1 Solve by graphing.
Graph each equation.
The lines have the same slope and the same $y$-intercept. So, the lines are the same.

In this context, $x$ and $y$ must be positive. Because the lines are the same, all the points on the line in Quadrant I are solutions of both equations.


So, the system of linear equations has infinitely many solutions.
Method 2 Solve by elimination.
Multiply Equation 1 by -3 and add the equations.

$$
\begin{array}{rlrlrl}
6 x+12 y & =48 & \text { Multiply by }-3 . \\
18 x+36 y=144 & & & & \begin{aligned}
-18 x-36 y & =-144 \\
18 x+36 y & =144 \\
&
\end{aligned} & \text { Revised Equation } 1 \\
0 & =0 & & \text { Edd the equations. }
\end{array}
$$

The equation $0=0$ is always true. In this context, $x$ and $y$ must be positive. So, the solutions are all the points on the line $6 x+12 y=48$ in Quadrant I. The system of linear equations has infinitely many solutions.
4. Look Back Choose a few of the ordered pairs $(x, y)$ that are solutions of Equation 1. You should find that no matter which ordered pairs you choose, they will also be solutions of Equation 2. So, infinitely many solutions seems reasonable.

## G) Core Concept

## Solving Linear Equations by Graphing

Step 1 To solve the equation $a x+b=c x+d$, write two linear equations.


Step 2 Graph the system of linear equations. The $x$-value of the solution of the system of linear equations is the solution of the equation $a x+b=c x+d$.

## EXAMPLE 1 Solving an Equation by Graphing

Solve $-x+1=2 x-5$ by graphing. Check your solution.

## SOLUTION

Step 1 Write a system of linear equations using each side of the original equation.


Step 2 Graph the system.

$$
\begin{array}{ll}
y=-x+1 & \text { Equation } 1 \\
y=2 x-5 & \text { Equation } 2
\end{array}
$$

Check

$$
\begin{aligned}
-x+1 & =2 x-5 \\
-(2)+1 & \stackrel{?}{=} 2(2)-5 \\
-1 & =-1
\end{aligned}
$$

## Solving Absolute Value Equations by Graphing

## EXAMPLE 2 Solving an Absolute Value Equation by Graphing

Solve $|x+1|=|2 x-4|$ by graphing. Check your solutions.

## SOLUTION

Recall that an absolute value equation of the form $|a x+b|=|c x+d|$ has two related equations.

$$
\begin{aligned}
a x+b & =c x+d & & \text { Equation 1 } \\
a x+b & =-(c x+d) & & \text { Equation 2 }
\end{aligned}
$$

So, the related equations of $|x+1|=|2 x-4|$ are as follows.

$$
\begin{aligned}
x+1 & =2 x-4 & & \text { Equation 1 } \\
x+1 & =-(2 x-4) & & \text { Equation 2 }
\end{aligned}
$$

\begin{gathered}
\text { System } 1 \\
y=x+1 \\
y=2 x-4
\end{gathered}
$$



The graphs intersect at $(5,6)$.

System 2
$y=x+1$
$y=-2 x+4$


The graphs intersect at (1,2).

So, the solutions of the equation are $x=5$ and $x=1$.

A solution of a linear inequality in two variables is an ordered pair $(x, y)$ that makes the inequality true. The graph of a linear inequality in two variables shows all the solutions of the inequality in a coordinate plane.

Because the inequality symbol is greater than or equal to, the line is solid and not dashed. Some graphing calculators always use a solid line when graphing inequalities. In this case, you have to determine whether the line should be solid or dashed, based on the inequality symbol used in the original inequality.

## Linear Inequalities

A linear inequality in two variables, $x$ and $y$, can be written as

$$
a x+b y<c \quad a x+b y \leq c \quad a x+b y>c \quad a x+b y \geq c
$$

where $a, b$, and $c$ are real numbers. A solution of a linear inequality in two variables is an ordered pair $(x, y)$ that makes the inequality true.

## EXAMPLE 1 Checking Solutions

Tell whether the ordered pair is a solution of the inequality.
a. $2 x+y<-3 ;(-1,9)$
b. $x-3 y \geq 8 ;(2,-2)$

## SOLUTION

a. $2 x+y<-3 \quad$ Write the inequality.

$$
\begin{aligned}
& 2(-1)+9 \stackrel{?}{<}-3 \\
& 7 \nless-3 \text { Substitute }-1 \text { for } x \text { and } 9 \text { for } y . \\
& \text { Simplify. } 7 \text { is not less than }-3 .
\end{aligned}
$$

So, $(-1,9)$ is not a solution of the inequality.
b. $x-3 y \geq 8 \quad$ Write the inequality.
$2-3(-2) \stackrel{?}{\geq} 8$
$8 \geq 8$
Substitute 2 for $x$ and -2 for $y$.
Simplify. 8 is equal to 8 .

So, $(2,-2)$ is a solution of the inequality.

The graph of a linear inequality in two variables shows all the solutions of the inequality in a coordinate plane.


## G) Core Concept

## Graphing a Linear Inequality in Two Variables

Step 1 Graph the boundary line for the inequality. Use a dashed line for $<$ or $>$. Use a solid line for $\leq$ or $\geq$.

Step 2 Test a point that is not on the boundary line to determine whether it is a solution of the inequality.

Step 3 When the test point is a solution, shade the half-plane that contains the point. When the test point is not a solution, shade the half-plane that does not contain the point.

## EXAMPLE 2 Graphing a Linear Inequality in One Variable

## STUDY TIP

It is often convenient to use the origin as a test point. However, you must choose a different test point when the origin is on the boundary line.

Check


Graph $y \leq 2$ in a coordinate plane.

## SOLUTION

Step 1 Graph $y=2$. Use a solid line because the inequality symbol is $\leq$.

Step 2 Test $(0,0)$.

$$
\begin{aligned}
& y \leq 2 \\
& 0 \leq 2
\end{aligned} \quad \begin{aligned}
& \text { Write the inequality. } \\
& \text { Substitute. }
\end{aligned}
$$

Step 3 Because $(0,0)$ is a solution, shade the half-plane that contains $(0,0)$.

## EXAMPLE 3 Graphing a Linear Inequality in Two Variables

Graph $-x+2 y>2$ in a coordinate plane.

## SOLUTION

Step 1 Graph $-x+2 y=2$, or $y=\frac{1}{2} x+1$. Use a dashed line because the inequality symbol is $>$.

Step 2 Test (0, 0).

$$
\begin{array}{rlrl}
-x+2 y & >2 & \text { Write the inequality. } \\
-(0)+2(0) & \stackrel{?}{=} 2 & \text { Substitute. } \\
0 & \ngtr 2 & & \text { Simplify. }
\end{array}
$$



Step 3 Because $(0,0)$ is not a solution, shade the half-plane that does not contain $(0,0)$.

Variables Let $x$ be pounds of grapes and $y$ be pounds of apples.
Inequality $2.50 \cdot x+1 \cdot y \leq 10$
Step 1 Graph $2.5 x+y=10$, or $y=-2.5 x+10$. Use a solid line because the inequality symbol is $\leq$. Restrict the graph to positive values of $x$ and $y$ because negative values do not make sense in this real-life context.

Step 2 Test ( 0,0 ).

$$
\begin{aligned}
2.5 x+y & \leq 10 & & \text { Write the inequality. } \\
2.5(0)+0 & \stackrel{?}{\leq} 10 & & \text { Substitute. } \\
0 & \leq 10 & & \text { Simplify. }
\end{aligned}
$$

Step 3 Because $(0,0)$ is a solution, shade the half-plane that contains $(0,0)$.
One possible solution is $(1,6)$ because it lies in the shaded half-plane. Another possible solution is $(2,5)$ because it lies on the solid line. So, you can buy 1 pound of grapes and 6 pounds of apples, or 2 pounds of grapes and 5 pounds of apples.

## Systems of Linear Inequalities

A system of linear inequalities is a set of two or more linear inequalities in the same variables. An example is shown below.

$$
\begin{array}{ll}
y<x+2 & \text { Inequality 1 } \\
y \geq 2 x-1 & \text { Inequality 2 }
\end{array}
$$

A solution of a system of linear inequalities in two variables is an ordered pair that is a solution of each inequality in the system.

## EXAMPLE 1 Checking Solutions

Tell whether each ordered pair is a solution of the system of linear inequalities.

$$
\begin{array}{ll}
y<2 x & \text { Inequality 1 } \\
y \geq x+1 & \text { Inequality 2 }
\end{array}
$$

a. $(3,5)$
b. $(-2,0)$

## SOLUTION

a. Substitute 3 for $x$ and 5 for $y$ in each inequality.

| Inequality 1 | Inequality 2 |
| :--- | :--- |
| $y<2 x$ | $y \geq x+1$ |
| $5 \stackrel{?}{<} 2(3)$ | $5 \stackrel{?}{\geq} 3+1$ |
| $5<6$ | $5 \geq 4$ |

Because the ordered pair $(3,5)$ is a solution of each inequality, it is a solution of the system.
b. Substitute -2 for $x$ and 0 for $y$ in each inequality.

| Inequality 1 | Inequality 2 |
| :--- | :--- |
| $y<2 x$ | $y \geq x+1$ |
| $0 \stackrel{?}{<} 2(-2)$ | $0 \stackrel{?}{\geq}-2+1$ |
| $0 \nless-4 X$ | $0 \geq-1$ |

$\rightarrow$ Because $(-2,0)$ is not a solution of each inequality, it is not a solution of the system.

## Graphing Systems of Linear Inequalities

The graph of a system of linear inequalities is the graph of all the solutions of the system.

## G) Core Concept

## Graphing a System of Linear Inequalities

Step 1 Graph each inequality in the same coordinate plane.

Step 2 Find the intersection of the half-planes that are solutions of the inequalities. This intersection is the graph of the system.

y>x+2 & \text { Inequality 2 }
\end{array}

## SOLUTION

Step 1 Graph each inequality.
Step 2 Find the intersection of the half-planes. One solution is $(-3,1)$.

The solution is the purple-shaded region.

## Writing Systems of Linear Inequalities

## EXAMPLE 4 Writing a System of Linear Inequalities

Write a system of linear inequalities represented by the graph.

## SOLUTION

Inequality 1 The horizontal boundary line passes through $(0,-2)$. So, an equation of the line is $y=-2$. The shaded region is above the solid boundary line, so the inequality is $y \geq-2$.


Inequality 2 The slope of the other boundary line is 1 , and the $y$-intercept is 0 . So, an equation of the line is $y=x$. The shaded region is below the dashed boundary line, so the inequality is $y<x$.

The system of linear inequalities represented by the graph is

| $y \geq-2$ | Inequality 1 |
| :--- | :--- |
| $y<x$. | Inequality 2 |

## EXAMPLE 5 Writing a System of Linear Inequalities

Write a system of linear inequalities represented by the graph.

## SOLUTION

Inequality 1 The vertical boundary line passes through $(3,0)$. So, an equation of the line is $x=3$. The shaded region is to the left of the solid boundary line, so the inequality is $x \leq 3$.


Inequality 2 The slope of the other boundary line is $\frac{2}{3}$, and the $y$-intercept is -1 . So, an equation of the line is $y=\frac{2}{3} x-1$. The shaded region is above the dashed boundary line, so the inequality is $y>\frac{2}{3} x-1$.

The system of linear inequalities represented by the graph is

$$
\begin{array}{ll}
x \leq 3 & \text { Inequality } 1 \\
y>\frac{2}{3} x-1 . & \text { Inequality } 2
\end{array}
$$
